Remembering the Risen Christ

As I write this reflection this morning, the rain is coming down heavy, the skies are grey, and the images of war, earthquake, tsunami, and nuclear power plants on fire are vying for attention. It is hard to know where to look. It is hard to know which to pray for first. Sometimes I simply say the names in a whisper, knowing that God knows, trusting that God is already at work even before the prayer is spoken. Japan. Libya. Christ Church. Haiti. Tunisia. Mexico. I could fill the page if I tried. It is a Lenten Season when the ashes of our world color our vision. My hope is that in the subdued hushes of our prayers, we remember to pray for ourselves, that we remember to ask for a heart so open, so accepting, that we are changed by the world and the events that happen within and upon it. We cannot change what has happened, but we can be changed. We cannot eliminate all that is broken or being broken, but we can point towards the one who redeems it all. Even in the darkness of destruction, life triumphs. It is what Easter is all about, after all. We walk through Lent towards and through the cross and crucifixion, but we hang our hat on the Risen Christ. Always and without fail, God Lives.

As we enter Holy Week, I invite you to participate as fully as you are able. It is the richness of this week that leads us to the full expression of Joy on Easter. The Thursday of Holy Week, Maundy Thursday, will bring with it a supper in the monastic tradition as a way of remembering Jesus' Last Supper. We will eat, and sing, and move through ritual. We will end up in the Church to share Holy Communion before we strip the altar and sanctuary bare. Good Friday will be a day of reflection on the last hours of Jesus' life. At noon, we will have a two-hour service where members of our congregation will share their own reflections. Please come if you can, not just to experience this powerful service, but also to support those who are willing to stand before us with their thoughts and words. At 2:00pm, we will walk the stations for an hour, and at 8:00pm, there will be a service of shadows and light called *Tennebrae*. Saturday at 8:00pm, we will celebrate the Easter Story beginning with salvation stories told by the congregation and ending with the proclamation of the Risen Christ. On Easter Sunday at 10:00am, we will celebrate the principal service of Easter followed by an Easter Egg hunt for the children. I look forward to celebrating our first Easter together.

We Celebrate and Nurture the Earth

April celebrates National Volunteer Month, National Volunteer Week, and Earth Day. There are many opportunities to volunteer and help make our community a better place to live. A study of Psalm 104 creates an awareness of the majestic and splendid gift that the Lord has given in creating the earth.

Each year Earth Day -- April 22 -- marks the anniversary of what many consider the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970. The fight for a clean environment continues in a climate of increasing urgency, as the negative effects of climate change become more apparent every day. How to participate or volunteer? There are many opportunities every day of the month. Here are a few suggestions:

The City of Fremont will be co-sponsoring a free Earth Day event with Washington Township Hospital on Saturday, April 23, at Washington Hospital West in the Main Auditorium from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. It's an opportunity to join a number of other local Tri-City organizations in making our community a greener place. *"Let's Go Green Together"* will feature interactive booths supporting environmental sustainability, conservation, pollution prevention, reducing waste and much more. The event will also feature games and activities for children.

Also on April 23, there will be an *Earth Day Cleanup* at the Don Edwards San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge 9:00 a.m. to Noon. Help protect wildlife and the environment while enjoying great Bay views. Join the Refuge and Save the Bay at their annual Earth Day Cleanup at Ravenswood Point in East Palo Alto. Reservations are required (www.savesfbay.org).

It's important to talk with our children and grandchildren about the beauty of the earth and the importance of protecting it. Expose them to nature by visiting a wildlife sanctuary or just taking a walk or going to the park (maybe a visit to Ardenwood Farm) or planting a tree or some flowers. As adults in a faith community, we have a powerful influence in helping our children and youth understand the direct impact they can have in creating a healthier, cleaner environment for the future -- starting today.

And, there are opportunities right here at St. James' to recycle and volunteer -- gather up your used books and volunteer to help at the St. James' Book Sale that will be happening soon; come to the Saturday work parties to help clean up and preserve our beautiful grounds; volunteer to help tend the Memorial Garden; and recycle at every opportunity.

Don't toss -- repair/Recycle most things
Use a refillable water bottle/Buy a setback thermostat
Walk More/Buy locally

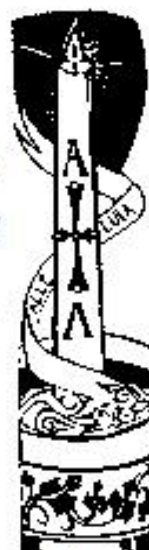

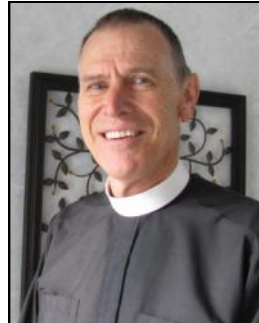
Walk-a-Rockathon 2011

Alameda Deanery Meeting

Three St. James' deanery representatives, Alice Johnson, Jim McConnell and Scott Whitaker, attended a Deanery meeting at Christ Church Alameda in order to participate in a discussion of the Anglican Covenant. The idea was to draft a covenant to provide a basic framework to sustain the minimal conditions which allow the Churches of the Communion to live together in harmony and unity. After many meetings, discussions and revisions, the covenant is now with the Provinces of the Anglican Communion for formal consideration for adoption by each Province through appropriate processes, which will occur during the Episcopal General Meeting in 2012. Due to all the controversy surrounding this covenant, it would be good for the covenant to be discussed amongst the parishioners and to make their feelings known. This deanery discussion is a first step.

The following questions were posed for reflection:

1. In what ways does the Anglican Covenant strengthen the corporate life of the Episcopal Church?
2. In what ways do you think the Anglican Covenant strengthens the common life of the Anglican Communion?
3. Which sections (or concepts in) of the Covenant do you find useful in defining the life of the Anglican Communion?
4. Do you find the Covenant's understandings of "unity," "the Church," and "authority" adequate? Why?
5. The Preamble to the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church define the Anglican Communion as a "fellowship" of churches. In what ways might the Anglican Covenant redefine The Episcopal Church's understanding of the Anglican Communion?

The discussion revolved around how we perceived the covenant's effect on the church in the US. The group had varying opinions and questions including:

1. Was the covenant a done deal?
2. How and where did the authoring group get its authority?

3. Was this a punishment for the US and Canadian churches?
4. Would a schism have unintended benefits in the US, e.g. increased membership?
5. Would the Anglican Communion suffer from the loss of the US church and its diversity?
6. Would we suffer by being in separation from the Communion?
7. What happens to companion dioceses?
8. What happens to US church aid to African nations?

The meeting notes and questions will be submitted to the Diocesan Office.

The Rev. Kathy Crary closed the meeting with prayer.

First Ever Imposition of Ashes & Confession for Children

On Shrove Tuesday, we had our first ever Imposition of Ashes and Confession for Children. Gathered together in the Little Church on pillows on the Altar steps, the children selected a confession stone and thought about what they might want to do better. When they were ready, they raised their hand in the air and placed their stone in the bowl where we washed them with water, symbolizing the way that God's love washes over them. After their confession, they all knelt at the altar rail to receive ashes on their foreheads, understanding that the ashes marked in the shape of a cross and were a reminder that they are Christians, people who learn about and try to follow the teachings of Jesus. The short service was meaningful and sweet, and we look forward to sharing it with the children again next year.
